

Saturday, July 13	Who was the Quartermaster General that Helped U.S. Grant Win the Civil War?	John Braidwood, will display copies of letters from his collection from Grant, Lincoln, Sheridan, and Stanton lauding the brothers' brilliant war-time accomplishments. His presentation gives credit to the men behind the scenes who are not often known, and therefore not given the credit they so richly deserved.
Sunday, July 21	Grant Remembrance Day	Re-enactors portraying Grant's family and close friends will gather on the Cottage porch and bid the man they loved and respected a final, very personal farewell.

A Flags at Half Mast Program – Moderated Panel Discussion	Hear three esteemed panelists - Frank Scaturro, Dr. George "Al" Goethals, and Dr. Andre Fleche - in a moderated panel discussion to uncover the real Ulysses S. Grant, as they separate fact from fiction and discover the man from the myth.
Saturday, August 10	Not All Secret Agents Wore Hoop Skirts	Dave Hubbard, Grant Cottage's Visitor Center & Group Sales Manager, will present a sequel to his 2017 program "Secret Agents in Hoop Skirts: Women Spies of the Civil War."

• New York State Legislature News for Veterans: On May 15, the State Assembly passed bill A5937 /S3889 and returned it to the Senate. The bill, *if signed into law*, will amend criminal procedure law to allow county courts to remove actions to another local criminal court in the same county designated a "problem solving court" to address matters concerning special types of defendants or victims. Problem solving courts include, but are not limited to drug courts, domestic violence courts, youth courts, mental health court, and <u>veterans courts</u>. Based on a successful pilot of a drug court in Rockland County, problem solving courts would enable counties to transfer cases from "one-size-fits-all" criminal courts and centralize similar cases in courts that can concentrate both law enforcement and therapeutic services that address a specific population with specific needs, such as veterans. Thus, veterans accused of crimes would be more likely to be treated fairly, with understanding, and receive appropriate sentencing and help to turn their lives around. The aim is to reduce the rate of recidivism for veterans and other populations caught up in criminal activities.
