NYS COUNCIL OF CHAPTERS CONVENTION



The Southern Tier Chapter hosted the 2014 COC Convention at the Radisson Hotel Corning. Our Chapter was well represented by Chapter President Tony Ficara, Marty Leukhardt, Ed and Jennifer Scheiber, Alex and Dolores Yvars, John and Connie

Foley, and Al and Mary Memole. Here is a brief summary of the event:

Reports from the Chapters for the Annual Business Meeting proved that the Chapters are still running strong across the State, even though we all face the same recruiting problem. Among the many presentations, the Genesee Valley Chapter recounted its pivotal role in getting the NYS Legislature to pass the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children. (NY was one of the last States to do so.) Southern Tier Chapter summarized the host of activities they support to help veterans. But, the brief talk by the thirty-something delegate from the State's newest Chapter, based in midtown Manhattan, was like a blast of fresh, invigorating air. The core of this new NYC Chapter is a group of young professionals who recently left military service, but wanted to maintain ties to the military. Their needs and concerns differ in some ways from those of many of us older retired members, but they represent MOAA's future. Their input can help the Chapters reach out to younger officers in our areas. Unfinished business: Who will host next year's convention, and when and where will it be held?

CHAPTER MEMBER ACTIVITIES

TOM & NANCY LENAHAN'S RUSSIAN ADVENTURE CRUISE, DAY 2

We awoke to the beginning of another busy day - breakfast at 7:00 and a time to meet new fellow travelers. Across the hall is a man originally from Utica. We had breakfast in the dining room early because our first tour gathered at 7:30 to leave for a trip to Pushkin to see the Catherine Palace.

The original palace was built for Catherine I, wife of Peter the Great, and it was expanded by their daughter, Elizabeth. The outside is blue and white, Russian baroque, 95 feet long. Elizabeth greatly



enlarged it in the middle of the 18th century and Catherine the Great expanded it still further. The most famous room was probably the Amber Room, originally covered with amber carvings which had been given to Peter the Great. In 1941 the palace was looted by Nazis and by the end of WWII the amber panels had disappeared. Great efforts failed to find the panels and after much research they were recreated and installed. In 1997 a German tried to sell a small part of an amber panel and it was returned to the palace. It proved to be almost exactly like the piece that was created to replace it. We went through the extensive Catherine's gardens and enjoyed the trip immensely.


We came back to the ship for lunch and then had a tour of St. Petersburg by bus - but with a lot of walking. We visited the Smolny cathedral with five white onion domes designed by Rastrelli during the reign of Catherine the Great and The Church of the Savior on Spilled Blood whose spire reaches 81 meters. We saw ST. Isaac's Cathedral, Saints Peter & Paul Cathedral with its tombs of the Russian nobility and the wonderful views of the center of St. Petersburg.

After dinner we went to a Cossack Folklore show with men and women doing Cossack dances and singers providing additional music. The show had lots of energy and was very good. We went just off the boat to a tent set up for the show. Then back to the boat for our cognac nightcap on the veranda overlooking the Niva River.

DAY 3

We woke up late and had a cafe' breakfast in the Panorama Bar next to our room - croissants, yogurt, coffee - then safety instruction with life jackets at 9:00 and a shore trip to the Winter Palace and the Hermitage. The architecture was amazing and the art work in the Hermitage overwhelming. It is restricted to art of Western Europeans. It has some 400 exhibit halls and salons - many more than we could visit in our 5 hour tour. Its collections are varied - paintings, clocks, silver and gold artifacts. The building itself is beautiful and wonderfully maintained. We did our best - were delighted with the works we saw, but truly exhausted at the end. (See photo, right.)

We returned for lunch/dinner at 3:00 and then attended a musical presentation on the boat by Carlos D'Onofrio from the Mariinsky



Theater - very personable and very talented!! Then at 6:30 a shore excursion to see Swan Lake!!! We returned to the ship at about 11:00pm - had a small snack in the dining room, brought tea back to our cabin then a short cognac on the veranda - a long, busy day!!!

DAY 4

Internet service has been extremely slow!!! It's hard to believe but we took a half day off from sightseeing on shore. We were really tired and needed a little while to recover. We enjoyed a leisurely breakfast and spent some time sending our e-mails, chatting with other travelers and just doing whatever we wanted.

After lunch we went ashore with a small group to visit a "shared Apartment", a communalka. Our hostess was a retired woman who has lived in the same apartment for many years. She had one large room which serves as a living room, dining room and a bedroom for her, her daughter (an anesthesiologist) and her granddaughter (a medical school student). She shared a bathing room, a WC - toilet- a kitchen and a room with stoves with 4 other family groups - a total of 17 people that included a child of 6 years. She shared all kinds of information with us. A large number of people in St. Petersburg have lived in this kind of community including their president (Putin).

On return we attended a captain's reception as we set sail from the pier of St. Petersburg to Lake Ladoga, the largest lake in Europe and on to Mandrogi. We enjoyed a champagne toast, a gourmet meal, and a very pleasant evening as we sailed off into the sunset - a lovely, balmy evening. Of course, we ended it all with a cognac on the veranda!!! DAY 5

We sailed all night entering Lake Ladoga, Europe's largest lake, covering over 7,000 square miles. Some of our fellow travelors told us it is as large as Switzerland. The night was broken up Ladozhskoye

by some rough seas. We found ourselves rolling about about 3:30 am but we had no ill effects and after about 15 minutes the water calmed and we went back to sleep. We had a leisurely breakfast and our tour escort Tatyana gave an hour presentation on this part of our tour followed by some information about souvenirs from this part of Russia presented by Ekaterina (Katherine).

After lunch we disembarked in Mandrogy. We arrived just at the end of lunch and were able to get off the ship a little early. Dmitry gave us information on this little area. It is made up of little shops where crafts peple work on and sell their wares. There are a number of painters of Matryoshka dolls, carvers, vendors of lace, a painter of icons, etc. There were several homes, but all were on display as shops.

We returned to the ship and sailed off at about 4:00. The chef had a demonstration (with two passengers), making pelmeni - a sort of Russian dumpling of beef and pork in a thin dough, cooked in water and served with sour cream. We then had a briefing about tomorrow's activities and a glimpse at the optional tours to be selected for Moscow. Dinner was served at 7:00 and we enjoyed time with some new friends, and then our nightly cognac on the veranda.


