#### HIGHLIGHTED CHARITY for this issue → WREATHS ACROSS AMERICA<sup>TM</sup>

Wreaths Across America<sup>TM</sup> (WAA) is a 501(c)(3) corporation whose mission is to **Remember**, **Honor**, **and Teach** Americans of all ages of the sacrifices made by those who served our nation in her Armed Forces. One of their main nationwide events is laying Christmas wreaths on veterans' graves at Arlington one Saturday in December and at veterans' cemeteries and other locations in all 50 states. This year's wreath laying event will be held nationwide on **December 19**. The organizers of the past WAA events at the *Gerald B*.



Solomon National Cemetery in Schuylerville hope to hold their traditional memorial ceremony this year prior to laying wreaths. Last year's event attracted around 3,000 participants, but if COVID restrictions preclude such a gathtering this year, one option under consideration is to allow 50 volunteers per day to lay wreaths over a period of a few days. The next issue of this newsletter will include updated information about the wreath laying and possible ceremony.

With or without a formal ceremony, residents of the Capital Region will remember and honor, with wreaths, the deceased veterans laid to rest in the G.B. Solomon National Cemetery. Our Chapter has been a local fundraising group for Wreaths Across America<sup>TM</sup> for several years, for which we get a small percentage of the total amount donated through our group. Thus, we encourage all Chapter members, your families and friends, to sponsor wreaths through our Chapter. You may sponsor one or more wreaths by mailing your payment along with the form on page 3 of this newsletter to WAA at their Maine address, or, following the instructions on page 4 of this newsletter, through the WAA website at <a href="https://www.wreathsacrossamerica.org/">https://www.wreathsacrossamerica.org/</a>. The cost to sponsor a single wreath is \$15. Our Chapter's WAA group code is NY0087P. We have yet to reach our goal of sponsoring 100 wreaths. So far, 1,492 total wreaths have been sponsored for the G.B. Solomon National Cemetery, which is only 11.4% of the goal. There are still 11,608 more graves to honor. Let's do it!




# Wreaths Across America<sup>TM</sup> - Guidance for Sponsoring Wreaths Online

- 1. On the home page, under the red "SPONSOR WREATHS" button, find and click on the tiny heading labeled "or Local Fundraising Group". That opens a box titled "Wreath Sponsorship; Choose Your Local Fundraising Group"
- 2. Click on the button for the number of wreaths you wish to sponsor. Then, in the box just above the red button labeled "Review of Sponsorships", click on the space to the right of the icon of two people labeled faintly "Select Group to Support."
- 3. With your cursor in the space, type in our group code **NY0087P**. The entry "New York State Chapter MOAA (NY0087P) (186010)" will appear *below* the space.
- 4. Click on "New York State Chapter MOAA (NY0087P) (186010)" The location "Gerald B. Solomon National Cemetery, Schuylerville" will appear below, to confirm you have the correct fundraising organization. Select the number of wreaths you wish to sponsor, and click on the red "Review of Sponsorships" button to be able to complete the transaction.

- CHAPTER OFFICERS & BOARD OF DIRECTORS. The Board held its meeting online through Cisco WebEx on Saturday, September 26 from 1000-1130 hrs. The Board resolved to identify a venue or venues for future meetings. Chapter Officers/Board Members agreed to stay in their positions for 1 year until a formal Nominating Committee can be formed next year. Two members have expressed interest in filling vacant positions, but we would still like at least two more, because we have two vacant Board positions and four vacant committee chairs (see next bulleted section). Our Legislative Affairs Committee continues to monitor the status of key legislation, but has paused holding direct meetings with our Representatives who are occupied with the upcoming election.
- <u>VACANT COMMITTEE CHAIRS</u>. Our Chapter could serve our members and the community
  more effectively if we had a few more members willing to take on any one of four key functions.
  THE DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THESE POSITIONS REQUIRE A *VERY SMALL TIME COMMITMENT*; NO MORE THAN YOU CAN AFFORD TO GIVE, and MOAA has
  guidance for volunteers. The committee functions include:
  - <u>Personal Affairs</u>. Serve as the main point of contact for Chapter members in need, and notify Chapter leadership when members move or pass away.
  - Public Relations. Interact periodically with local news media and ideally social media to provide Chapter contact information and publicize events, so that prospective members and the Capital District community in general can learn who we are and what we do.
  - Surviving Spouse Liaison. Reach out to surviving spouses to provide comfort and assistance whenever one of our members dies, inform them of benefits, and let them know that the Chapter and MOAA have not forgotten them.
  - Transition Assistance Program. Serve as the point of contact for active and prospective MOAA members in the Capital District who are leaving military service in the active or reserve component, many needing help with contacts and leads for a second career or transitional employment.
- <u>CHAPTER MEMBERSHIP DUES</u>. The Board voted <u>not</u> to raise dues for 2021, so dues will remain \$30 per year. Thanks to the 38 members who paid this year:

## **BOOK REVIEW**

#### <u>LINCOLN'S FOREIGN LEGION: The 39<sup>th</sup> New</u> <u>York Infantry – The Garibaldi Guard</u>



I found this book among my late father's possessions. I remember him showing it to me when he got it years ago, and I finally got around to reading it this September. The author is not an academic or a military historian, but a professional actor who became interested in the 39<sup>th</sup> NY Volunteer Infantry while researching history for period films. He spent about 10 years studying English, Italian, and French language sources on the unit. My chief criticisms are: 1) the book has some great old photos, but absolutely NO maps. So, the detailed accounts of each battle could confuse a reader who doesn't have Civil War battle maps handy or can't mentally visualize battle geography and topography; 2) there were a few distracting editing errors and a decision to spell names in different ways as they appear in original documents. For example, the soldier Killiam Van Rensselaer (probably a descendant of our famous patroon), is identified in different places as William Von Renssalaer, and other spellings. Despite those two negatives, the story itself is very interesting, and the author tells it well, maintaining a good flow. I definitely recommend this book, but concede that it probably would appeal mostly to die-hard Civil War buffs.

The author, Bacarella, begins the tale with accounts of the unit's namesake, Giuseppe Garibaldi. His exploits and worldwide reputation explain the origin of the 39<sup>th</sup> and the spirit that drove recruiting and motivated its officers and soldiers (well, most of them), a number of whom had served under Garibaldi in battle. Also, the US federal Government actively courted Garibaldi to accept a commission to command a division. Garibaldi, who detested



slavery, was strongly tempted to accept, but didn't, as we know from history. Bacarella explains why in a fascinating side story. The idea to form the unit named for him came from a flamboyant polyglot Hungarian immigrant in New York named Frederick D'Utassy (*at left*; not his real name). D'Utassy's is a story unto itself: He was a complete fraud! Yet, he hoodwinked a lot of influential people, successfully raised the regiment and led it to war. He also finagled a multitude of ways to enrich himself at the expense of his soldiers and the government. He lasted quite a long time, but did finally get his comeuppance, and that episode will make you laugh out loud. (I won't tell and spoil it – you'll have to read the book to find out.)

D'Utassy adopted the name "Garibaldi Guard" (GG) for the regiment to attract and recruit members of the diverse immigrant communities in and around New York City. The original 10 line companies were organized by nationality and primary language: 1<sup>st</sup> (A) Italian; 2<sup>nd</sup> (B) Swiss; 3<sup>rd</sup> (C), 5<sup>th</sup> (E), 6<sup>th</sup> (F), 8<sup>th</sup> (H), and 9<sup>th</sup> (I) from the various German states (pre-unification); 4<sup>th</sup> (D) Spanish, Portuguese, and Latin American; 7<sup>th</sup> (G) Hungarian, Slavic, and Prussian; and 10<sup>th</sup> (K) France and French Canadian. Many of the soldiers spoke English poorly or not at all. The GG participated in many important battles, including Bull Run, Harpers Ferry, Gettysburg, The Wilderness, Spotsylvania, Cold Harbor, and Petersburg, right up to Lee's surrender. The unit had its share of problems with discipline, poor leadership, intrigue, and even murder, but managed to distinguished itself in most of its engagements. Bacarella routinely included bland recitations of daily report type information (sick call, reassignments, desertions, promotions, transitions, arrests, demotions, etc.) Some readers might see that detracting from the story, but, dull as it might be, it gave a clearer sense of reality – the changes and organizational turbulence that units typically experience and the fact that, throughout most of its existence, the regiment was occupied by activities other than combat (training, marching, recuperating, watching, guarding, patrolling, etc.) This book presented the full story: the glory, the shame, and commonplace.
