Wreaths Across AmericaTM (WAA) is a 501(c)(3) corporation whose mission is to **Remember**, **Honor**, **and Teach** Americans of all ages about the sacrifices made by those who served in the Armed Forces of our nation. Our Chapter supports this worthy cause in two ways:

- 1. SPONSOR WREATHS. Please ask your families, friends, local organizations and businesses to sponsor wreaths through our Chapter. The cost to sponsor a single wreath is now \$17. Donors may sponsor one or more wreaths by mailing a check along with the form on pg.8 of this newsletter to WAA at their Maine address, or, through the WAA website at https://www.wreathsacrossamerica.org/ following the instructions on pages 9 & 10 of this newsletter,. Our Chapter's WAA group code is NY0087P. Wreaths sponsored through us are designated for placement at the Gerald B. H. Solomon Saratoga National Cemetery, located at 200 Duell Rd, Schuylerville, NY. For each wreath sponsored through our Chapter, WAA returns \$5 to us. We turn this revenue back to the community by donating to other worthy local charities benefitting the community, local veterans, and historical and military-related organizations.
 - A total of 7,132 wreaths have been sponsored as of September 22, representing 47.2% of the total number needed. 7,968 more wreaths are needed before December's wreath laying event.
- 2. LAY WREATHS ON VETERANS' GRAVES. There are 15,100 veteran graves at the Saratoga National Cemetery. *Volunteers* from our local community lay all these wreaths, pausing after placing each wreath to salute and remember the veteran, saying his or her name. *We encourage all of you to attend the ceremony and help place wreaths if you are able*. This year's wreath laying event at Saratoga will be held on **Saturday**, **December 16**. **Wreath placement begins at 10:30 AM**, followed by a solemn memorial ceremony honoring the fallen and deceased veterans of each military service at the flagpole **at 12:00 noon**. This is a very moving experience.

Chapter News and other local items of interest

• <u>LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS COMMITTEE REPORT</u> (Submitted by Pat Piccirilli, Legislative Affairs Committee, Sep 13, 2023)

In theory, everyone knows what the 2024 defense budget will be. The debt ceiling deal signed into law in May set a cap on total defense spending of \$886 billion. However, as Fiscal Year (FY) 2023 winds down, the Senate and House defense authorization committees have each passed their versions of the FY 2024 NDAA. In the coming months, leaders from the Senate and House of Representatives will meet in conference to reconcile the two chambers' versions of the NDAA to produce a compromise bill (the current two separate NDAA versions are H.R. 2670 and S.2226. MOAA will continue to engage with Congress, the executive branch, and other

important stakeholders as the FY 2024 NDAA makes its way through the legislative process to ensure the issues most important to the uniformed services community remains at the forefront of this year's bill. **You can help by lending your voice to our cause by signing up at the MOAA**Legislative Action Center. Here's what you should know about the contents of the House version (H.R. 2670), which passed on July 14, and the Senate version, (S. 2226), which passed July 27.

Topline Authorization

The Senate FY24 NDAA calls for \$886 billion in accordance with a debt ceiling deal, while the house version calls for \$875 billion. Lawmakers on both sides of the aisle and in both chambers painfully acknowledge DoD has not passed an audit and are committed to ensuring an audit is completed for improved oversight of spending taxpayers' dollars. A tough negotiation is expected in the conference given the lower topline number in the House NDAA.

Pay, Benefits, and Quality of Life

- **5.2% Pay Raise.** While you won't find it in the legislative text of either the House or Senate version, Congress supported the pay raise by keeping it tied to the Employment Cost Index a key MOAA priority. The defense appropriations bill may seek to address pay table reform.
- Needs Allowance (BNA). MOAA prefers the House language, which removes the Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) from BNA eligibility calculations to ensure families struggling with food insecurity have access to this needed benefit. The Senate bill extends the authority of service secretaries to determine high-cost areas or "a demonstrated need" in the implementation of the BNA.
- **CONUS COLA.** The Senate included a provision to increase access to the CONUS cost-of-living allowance (COLA) for servicemembers stationed in high-cost areas. Currently, the rate is paid when a servicemember or their family is in an area where non-housing expenses are 8% over the national average. The Senate language would reduce it to 5%.
- **Family Separation Allowance.** The House bill contains a provision increasing Family Separation Allowance II (FSA-II) from \$250 per month to \$400 per month. FSA-II was raised to \$250 in 2004 and hasn't been adjusted since. This payment provides a vital source of income to help families offset additional costs when their servicemember is away.
- **Housing.** The House version would authorize \$200 million more than requested by the administration to improve housing and barracks. Both chambers included the establishment of a Military Housing Readiness Council to provide enhanced oversight and more consistent engagement with stakeholders.
- Child Care. DoD, like the nation, is experiencing a significant shortage of child care providers. In an effort to address the shortage, the House NDAA includes a standardized program to provide discounted child care for DoD child care employees, starting with no fee for the first child and no more than 50% for the second child. Both NDAA versions address the need to focus on recruitment and retention of employees for child development programs. The House version also requires DoD to conduct a recurring review and revision of pay for child care staff.
- **Spouse Employment.** The House version expands the military spouse licensing and business costs reimbursement program to include more transitioning spouses. It also provides a modest amount of student loan deferment for dislocated military spouses. Both the Senate and House bills contain provisions that would provide military spouses with assistance in obtaining doula certifications.

Military Health Care

- Pharmacy Network Cuts. Both the House and Senate responded to MOAA's call for a report on how TRICARE pharmacy network cuts have impacted beneficiary access to prescription drugs. The Senate Armed Services Committee (SASC) included directive report language for a Government Accountability Office (GAO) evaluation on beneficiary access in their committee report. The House bill includes a provision for DoD reporting on access changes resulting from the narrowed network.
- Military Health System Reform Oversight. The SASC report includes a directive for a GAO assessment of military medical staffing at military treatment facilities (MTFs) to address reported challenges with competing priorities between the services and the Defense Health Agency (DHA). The SASC also requires a DoD brief on military personnel staffing of MTFs and the management structure for DHA's authority, direction, and control of those facilities.

Arlington National Cemetery

A provision in the House version of the NDAA signals lawmakers' intent to <u>protect burial with military honors</u> and prevent a reduction in service-earned benefits. The House version contains language from the Expanding America's National Cemetery Act (<u>H.R. 1413</u>) requiring a joint report from DoD and the VA with "a proposal to increase national cemetery capacity through the expansion or modification of a national cemetery that has, or will have, the capacity to provide full military honors."

Basic Allowance for Housing

As reported in the September issue of **Military Officer** the Senate reintroduced its version of the BAH Restoration Act (S.1823) matching the House's version (H.R. 2537) introduced in April. Both bills will require Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) to mirror 100% of the cost of rent and utilities.

Major Richard Star Act

Additionally, neither the House nor the Senate version of the FY 2024 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA) includes language from the Major Richard Star Act, a bipartisan bill supported by nearly 400 lawmakers to support combat-injured veterans.





Gerald B.H. Solomon Saratoga National Cemetery

Self-touring the cemetery, starting at the Public Information Center (PIC), the following structures, items, notable graves, and locations are indicated below by letters A through O.

A. The Public Information Center (PIC):

- Water fountains and public restrooms are available from dawn to dusk at the PIC.
- The office at the PIC is operated by volunteers most days to answer questions, provide various information sheets and brochures, and to assist in locating the final resting places of loved ones.
- A computer Kiosk is also located at the PIC for visitors to locate the gravesites of those laid to rest in the Gerald B.H. Solomon Saratoga National Cemetery.

B. The Gettysburg Tree:

- On the west end of the PIC, the end toward the Cemetery entrance, is a small tree near a Memorial Bench for the Gold Star Mothers. This tree is a "cutting" from an actual tree that was standing, and still is, at the site where Abraham Lincoln gave his famous Gettysburg Address.
- C. Ships bell from the USS Saratoga, CV-3

D. The Main Flagpole & Assembly Area:

- This is where the major ceremonies are held, such as for Memorial Day, Veterans Day and Wreaths Across America. Various other ceremonies are held here and throughout the cemetery during the year as well.
- E. Section 7, Site 124 The Grave of the Unknown Civil War Soldier:
 - It is the only headstone that is a different shape than all the others in the cemetery.
- F. Section 7, Site 103 Medal of Honor Recipient Spec. 4th Class Raymond Wright
- G. Section 8, Site 530 Medal of Honor Recipient Sgt. Thomas Baker
 - The lettering on the Medal of Honor headstones is in gold as opposed to the black on all others.

H. Columbarium C:

 The newest columbarium in the cemetery. The first internments in this area were in the spring of 2022.

Columbarium's A & B:

- These two Columbarium's are mirror images of one another, separated by a common area which includes a flag for each Branch of Service. Another flagpole is planned to be erected soon for the new Space Force Branch of Service.
- J. Section 18, across from Columbarium's A&B, and Section 19, behind the Branch of Service Flagpoles, are designated for those who have been cremated but wish to be buried in the ground.
- K. Section 20, Site 7 Congressman Gerald B.H. Solomons' gravesite.

L. The Memorial Path:

 The Memorial Path features several memorials erected by various veteran and fraternal organizations in honor of events and fallen comrades. The Carillon, a tower with speakers, and a digital control panel at the Administration Building, was donated by The American Veterans (AMVETS) in 1999 and upgraded in 2022.

M. Memorial Section:

 These are Memorial headstones for deceased active-duty service members and Veterans whose remains have not been recovered or identified, are buried at sea, donated to science or whose cremated remains have been scattered elsewhere.

N. Committal Shelters 1 & 2:

- Special honors are bestowed to a deceased Veteran which include a Military Honor Guard, a
 Rifle Detail who will provide a Three Volley Salute, and a Bugler who will play Taps. The
 American Flag which drapes the coffin will be removed and folded. The Flag and three bullet
 casings from the Three Volley Salute are presented to the Next of Kin.
- After the Military Honors a short service and comments are typically given by the funeral home representative and/or family members.
- In the case of a non-veteran, such as the spouse or dependent child of a Veteran, the procedures are the same except there are no Military Honors.

O. Columbarium and Garden Niches G1 - G32:

- This area consists of 24 Walls with Nitches for the interred cremains and 32 Sections in the ground for those who wished to be buried. The markers for those buried in this area are flush to the surface of the ground.
- Section G12 Site 001 Medal of Honor Recipient Tech Sgt. Peter J. Dalessandro

NEW USS ALBANY MEMORIAL PARK

The Rensselaer County Veterans Service Agency forwarded information from Wayne V. Van Amburgh that the USS Albany Association and the City of Rensselaer have entered into an agreement to provide a Memorial Park to honor all those that proudly served aboard any ship named "Albany" from 1846 to present. The contractor that was selected, A-Z Landscaping Inc., is headed by owner-operator Steve Noel, a Marine Corps Veteran. Steve expressed his willingness to work with the Association as they conduct a public fundraising campaign. Due to rising costs of materials, the project is trying to downscale, renegotiate, or change requirements and specifications. They are looking for support from electrical & lighting contractors, vendors, businesses, state agencies, Rensselaer County, veteran groups, military organizations, and the general public, as well as from members of the USS Albany Association who have been extremely generous. Currently, the memorial fund has \$30,000 in the bank *and needs about another* \$50-60,000, based on recent quotes and material costs, to complete the project. They are confident that they will be able to bring this to fruition with help from private and public donors.

The memorial stone and flagpoles have been ordered and meetings with state and county reps are scheduled. They have been making some cost-effective modifications and are confident that they can pull this together and complete it between the end of September or October 2023. The site location is in the City of Rensselaer's Riverfront Park overlooking the Hudson River, the Albany skyline and the backdrop of the USS Slater (DE766). Here is the Concept Drawing:

We were also honored by the presence of two "Rock Stars" from MOAA

Another powerful keynote speech was presented at the Convention's Welcome Dinner by Capt.

Jonathan Guagenti, 105th Airlift Wing, NY Air National Guard. In August 2021, the 105th received the mission to airlift a special operations unit and its helicopter to Kabul, Afghanistan, as the situation there began to deteriorate rapidly. Because our Chapter wants to have Capt. Guagenti speak at one of our meetings next year, there will be no spoilers here, but suffice it to note that constantly changing orders and instructions along with deadly and hazardous flying and landing conditions made for no little excitement. Besides the initial mission, the crew made two refugee evacuation flights, and, on departure from theater, flew the remains of the 13 service members killed in the terrorist bombing to Kuwait, where they were transferred to USAF for their final flight home. Capt. Guagenti gave such a spell-binding account of dedication, courage, determination, perseverance, tragedy, and even humor. We really hope we can have him speak at one of our luncheons.
